As we prepare for our 2021 campaign, I was given the opportunity by Mthr. Waltman to serve as your Usher at a recent Sunday's drive-by communion. Driving over on Sunday morning I had it in my mind that the offertory plate would remain empty for the 30 minutes that I would be present. Was I wrong!



We are all familiar with the saying, "My cup runneth over." To my very pleasant surprise, my offertory plate runneth over! The envelopes, cash, checks, and wonderful comments made my day this past Sunday. Several of you asked about the upcoming Stewardship Campaign and said you were looking forward to it. Two separate cars of wonderful parishioners asked me if money is still coming in and whether or not they could do more to help.

One car of faithful parishioners told me they pledged online but suddenly I found a wad of cash being dropped into the plate by them. Gretchen and I are also pledging online at the current time, but Gretchen opened her purse and added more cash to the plate. Another faithful parishioner asked me about our Rector's discretionary fund, and I indicated that I was not sure about Fr. Jambor's current balance but suggested a gift to him, Mthr. Waltman, and Mthr. Hill would be deeply appreciated.

At a few minutes past 10:00, Fr. Jambor signaled that we were through. I looked down at the offertory plate, which was brimming full and realized that at All Saints' we are **Moving Forward Together**!

This experience reminded me of the Widow's Offering in Mark 12:41-43. Jesus sat down opposite the place where the offerings were put and watched the crowd putting their money into the temple treasury. Many rich people threw in large amounts. But a poor widow came and put in two very small copper coins, worth only a fraction of a penny.

Calling his disciples to him, Jesus said, "I tell you the truth this poor widow has put more into the treasury than all the others. They all gave out of their wealth; but she, out of her poverty, put in everything — all she had to live on."

Fr. Jambor has received photos and an update on Amazing Grace Children's Home and School (AGISSA) from **Fr. Ogacho** and his wife, **Clarice**.

All across Kenya, schools have been closed during the pandemic. This includes AGISSA. Boarding students such as our AGISSA girls have all been sent back into their extended family villages.

The newest girls are all fine. They recently came back to Amazing Grace with their adult guardians for supplies and food. Each girl took home 10 kgs. of maize, 2 kg. of rice, 2 kg. of beans, 2 kg. millet, margarine, soap, underwear, and socks. They are getting tutoring back at their extended family villages.

The Secondary school girls are mostly fine. Madeline Perry is waiting for college placement (nothing going on now in Kenya, all schools are closed). She will need computer lessons (\$256 US).

College girls are all well except for Emmaculate Awuor, who has been hospitalized with meningitis. Her recovery may not be complete; prayers are appreciated.

Vivian Achieng is tutoring nearby kids and staying in one of our mabati houses on campus.

The only staff still on campus are the deputy principal and his wife, the chicken caretaker (Fred) and two groundsmen. The 5 security personnel are still on full salary.

The chickens are doing well. The hens give them 7 trays a day of eggs which are purchased by local traders and The Cummings.

The Cummings staff has been trimmed to just 3 people per day. Business is picking up, with a conference next week.

Fr. Ogacho is well. Clarice has had some bouts of malaria requiring quinine. She also injured her back while farming and is not getting physical therapy for that. There are 10 people in their household: two orphan boys they took in back in 2013; their late son's wife and her two children; Ivy and Celestine Mukudi, orphans at Amazing Grace with no extended family to take them in, and one laborer. They lost three dairy cows from a strange disease. They have not lacked for food and thank God that He has given them other children in their lives which are a big blessing.

Our adult Bible Study for fall is a 10-module course entitled God, Christ, and Satan in Scripture, taught by Fr. Jambor and Mthr. Hill.


The course has four modules:


- The Evolution of Satan in Scripture



Morning Prayer podcasts are available at 7:00 a.m., and often earlier, and Evening Prayer is now available by 4:00 p.m.


















Fr. Jambor sprinkles holy water on a child's bookbag.
